Bob Raabe

Some time ago our intrepid reporter decided to do a series about some of our more experienced growers. This is the third of that series.

Bob Raabe built his first orchid house in about 1970. He couldn't afford pipe and mesh at the time so a friend of his, Steve Waters Senior, let him have some Moreton Bay ash saplings, taken from one of his bullock's paddocks. Steve was a big grower in Ipswich at the time.

Bob built his bush house and often wondered what the dry, dusty deposits were on the Orchid leaves. Sadly, it only took the borers about three months to chew them all to pieces. He then got some used pipe from the steam train engines they were restoring at the railway workshops, cut lengths out of it and welded them into an 'A' frame with 70% shade cloth. Once complete, he got together a small collection of Australian native orchids.

During that time he became friendly with a couple of good orchid growers in the Ipswich Orchid Society and started to get a few extra exotics plants into his collection. It was then he also took his exams and was accepted into the PMG (now Telstra). This led to his transfer to Gladstone and later to the Sunshine Coast. Each time he moved, his orchids went with him. He eventually settled down in Coes Creek Road, Nambour, and built a small but very good orchid house. That was when he decided to start to seriously grow orchids.

Now a genuine orchid enthusiast, he joined Nambour O S and was the club's librarian for a number of years. He went on to hold the positions of Vice-President and President with the club, respectively. When he decided to move back to Ipswich he joined the West Moreton Orchid Group and held the positions of Vice President and President there for four years. Once again though, he moved back to the Sunshine Coast and re-joined his old club. He is still a member to this day, many years later.

Bob has also been a judge for quite some years now. Although some people question the decisions of the judges from time to time, his collection of orchids consists of nearly all of the genera - except for Cymbidiums and Phallies - but he does favour Vanda a little bit extra.

He tells me he has made some amazing friends during his orchid years. He is also very thankful for a very tolerant and supportive wife, Joan. **Mal**

Transporting orchids by car

With the orchid show season coming up, getting your orchids prepared for a show and transporting them, can be difficult. Bert Morris was asking how to transport a Dendrobium which was a tall plant but also with long spikes. So, it started me thinking about transporting orchids to shows and meetings. Cattleya are among the easiest as they can be packed into a box with paper and they aren't all that tall (except for C. *bowringiana* and spotted cats).

Vanda can be difficult as they are taller and with their root system, they can become a challenge to fit into a box, let alone think about their height.

This is about ways to transport tall orchids in your average size vehicle. I once took a Laelia splendida to a Bribie show and the spike was quite long (spike & plant, about 2 metres high). When I took it inside, I had to be careful of the ceiling fans. I think at the time, I was driving a station wagon, and had lowered the back seats, laid the plant flat, making the plant snug by chocking the pot, and the head of flowers hung over the edge of the back seat.

To stop the head of flowers bouncing up and down, I tied stakes to it, making it more stable. I once transported a cattleya for an award judging at Bribie Island. The gentleman who graciously took me with him, didn't use his aircon, preferring to leave his windows down. By the time we got to our destination, the spike was quite bedraggled and not suitable for showing. My friend shall remain anonymous. With a tall plant with multiple spikes, it becomes more difficult. If you have a wagon, lower the seats and lay the plant flat.

How to stop all those spikes bouncing into each other or breaking? Try tying thin bamboo stakes to the spikes (on a horizontal plane) to keep the spikes apart. This stabilises the spikes also.

Alan Parkes recently transported a large plant of Bulbophyllum rothschildianum to a show and using an upturned round medium size coffee table and using stretchy bungee cords to hold it in place. If you let your mind wander (as mine often does), I am sure you could think of many ways to transport orchids using what you have in your home or shed. **Mal**



Judges Choice - April- Rhynchorides Memoria Suranaree 'Blue'

In May 2012 Mal, Bill and I visited Brighton Nursery, it had virtually closed down with very few plants left in the bush house. But they still had seedlings, I purchased three of them and this one is by far the best of them It is a cross between *Aerides lawrenceae x Rhynchostylis coelestis* The cross was made in1968 and registered by Wipa Orchids in Thailand This year was the first time it has flowered, with 34 flowers I personally prefer Vandas with long spikes and many flowers As with all my Vanda's it is under 50% shade with very little mix in the pots. I have Old mans beard hanging from the top of the pot down around the roots as it holds moisture and helps with humidity I water daily with a low strength fertiliser and they get regular doses of Seasol.

I water daily with a low strength fertiliser and they get regular doses of Seasol, Calcium nitrate and Magnesium sulfate

During really hot dry weather I mist around the roots making sure not to get water on the leaves. **Richard**

Judges Choice - Novice - Ctt. Chocolate Drop "Kodama"

We have had the plant for more than 20 years. It's first was registered in 1965. It has flowers of dark red and burgundy with multi levels of fragrances of lemon citrus, jasmine and gardenia.

It flowers for well over a month and sometimes longer. It is a favorite in our collection of orchids. It grows well in our greenhouse in potting medium of bark and a bit of charcoal. We fertilize it twice per year. **Patrick & Heather**





Species

Plant of the Month - Paphiopedilum praestans

Taxonomists have been arguing about the name for the past 20 years or so. Cribb says it is a variety of *Paph. glanduliferum* but others say it is a separate species. The Kew Monocot List says both names are valid so we have retained the *praestans* name.

The plant was originally discovered in a small area in the north western corner of West Papua and nearby islands and occurs nowhere else so far as we know.

It grows at low altitudes on limestone rock and humus. The plant was acquired 4 years ago and this is its first flowering.

We grow it in our normal Paph mix of Kiwi bark plus 15% perlite and 15% charcoal. **Charlie & Gina**

Cultural Plant - Dendrobium fairchidiae

Comes from Luzon in the Philippines, and is found at about 1000/ 1500metres.

It is a large, cool growing epiphytical orchid, it has long slender canes that can be up to 1.5 metres long. Flowering during late summer at the apex of older leafless

canes.

The racemes carry 4 to 9 flowered.

My plant was purchased from Stockers in 2009 and this being the first flowering.

The plant is grown in bark and under 70% shade. **Rod**
