There was an opulence of other flowers to be admired and the Champion Den lindleyi was well worth its ribbons (gaining the Best Species as well). The plant of the month was Cym lowianum grown by Alan Shield.



Cym lowianum was purchased at our Nambour Orchid Show in 2006. it came from Val & Hazel Siebenhausen.

After flowering in 2009 it was divided into three plants. It is one orchid that flowers annually and needs to be trained as the flower spike grows to obtain a nice even curve, and allow the stalk to strengthen and not drop in a straight line down. This training allows the flowers to be well displayed.

I have been trying some organic fertilizer on the cymbidiums for the last year to see how they respond.

The article on the following page is an extract from the Bundaberg Orchid Society Newsletter for August 2010

The article is on ORCHID FLECK VIRUS or (How to lose some good plants easily)





Recently I decided that one section of my orchid collection, ie. Oncidium intergeneric, was not progressing as well as I would have expected. Many of the seedlings purchased over the previous 2-3 years did not seem to be growing well. The mature plants were generally growing well, but the foliage was displaying signs of disease, mainly black spotting, which I assumed was bacterial in origin. I undertook treatment with Algaecide and various insecticides to attempt to cure and prevent spread. This seemed to result in some improvement, at least with new growth showing less evidence of disease. I also noticed that some of the normally better flowering plants were not producing good inflorescences, even allowing for the usual variation year by year.



After a further few months of procrastination, I had a closer look at some of the seed-lings and noticed that most of them seemed to have areas of chlorosis (reduction of normal green colouration) +/- minute necrotic spots on the leaves. When my best Wildcatt turned up its heels and died, I decided to investigate further. Suspecting the worst, I sent a leaf sample to a laboratory for virus testing. Unfortunately, the result was predictably disastrous viz. Orchid fleck virus. On closer examination, most of the intergeneric plants and some of the dendrobiums showed similar signs of infestation so I made the decision to dispose of the lot. Orchid fleck rhabdovirus was first reported in Cymbidium species in Japan in 1969. It has a long list of synonyms including Dendrobium leaf streak virus, Dendrobium virus, Laelia red leafspot, short orchid rhabdovirus, Phalaenopsis cholotic spot virus. Genera reported as having been affected include Cymbidium, Phalaenopsis, Renanthera, Coelogyne, Dendrobium, Miltonia, Odontoglossum, Oncidium, Paphiopedilum, Vanda. Common symptoms are chlorotic areas often with necrotic centres or rings. Transmission is by mechanical inoculation usually by insects such as mites or grasshoppers. Obviously, cutting instruments are another likely form of

mechanical transmission. The virus is not generally transmitted by simple contact or mechanical abrasion of leaves. Definitive diagnosis is by electron micros-copy. Treatment, as for all viruses, is by disposal of infected plants. Rhabdoviruses (Some interesting /? useless information) - Affects

both plants and animals. Over 200 stains affect humans of which Rabies is probably the best known. With the benefit of hindsight, I have concluded that I probably acquired the virus via a bulk purchase of Dendrobium plants from another grower. My ignorance of the need for strict appraisal of purchased plants (especially from older collections) has led to a loss of a sizable portion of my collection.
