Haraella odorata chosen as the Reserve champion at Montville, is the cutest little plant. Owned by our President Bill Letcher, it is growing very happily on a cork mount. It is a miniature sized Taiwanese epiphytic orchid that requires year round watering. It was first discovered in 1930. Orchid Wiz & Kew has it as *Haraella retrocalla*.

The following article was emailed by one of our members for inclusion in the newsletter.

NEW SPIKE TYING METHOD

BILL LETCHER has come up with a new way to tie your flower spikes and it doesn't require the use of a stake.

The walls of Bill's bush houses are shadecloth and plastic with chicken wire on the inside to reinforce the wall and to hang plants on. We all know that flower spikes need to be staked and trained and we all forget to do it or we miss it, and we try to stake the spike after it has flowered. This usually doesn't work, because the flowers are then not facing the right way.

Bill's method is to allow the flower spike to grow between the chicken wire netting and the shadecloth/plastic wall and never has to worry about when to stake as they seem to grow upright naturally. To take the plant to a show, Bill has to either cut the spike off, or cut a hole in the wire netting. Cutting off the spike is not desirable as we don't like to see plants on the showbench **minus** their flowers. Having holes in your wire netting wall is not desirable either.

This is a tongue in cheek article, but I do recall seeing a couple of pairs of wire cutters located strategically in Bill's bush houses.

The Must know about Molasses:

When using molasses as a fertilizer, make sure, when mixed with water it is used almost IMMEDIATELY. The enzyme that comes to life in water, has a very short life period. It is this enzyme that makes it a great fertilizer. Once the enzyme dies, fermentation starts and if used at this stage can lose all effects as a fertilizer.

Ants are NOT attracted to molasses, and you will not get an invasion of ants using it.

Molasses dilutes very easy in cold water and can also be used as a deterrent for

possums. (Not many people have a possum problem with orchids although they do like the flowers.)

Molasses is a fantastic source of carbon and carbohydrate and contains many trace elements that can really give plants a boost.

As with all fertilizer, a little often is more beneficial than in heavy doses. I use 1/2 to 3/4 small cups to 10 litres of water and, as I rotate my fertilizers, I use it once a month.
