Tips from Peter Heaton on growing Maiden Hair ferns.

Keep them out of any strong wind.

Don't grow them where they will get full sun between 8 am. and 5 pm. in Summer and 10 am. and 3 pm. in Winter.

Water them regularly "when they need it".

Keep a little cup or tray under your fern pot and when it is dry water the plant.

Plant in a good potting mix suitable for ferns.

Fertilize your ferns but at half the recommended mix for seedlings.

The plant of the month was Onc Twinkle 'Weston' grown by Judy Robbins. Below is a picture of Onc. Twinkle 'Weston'.



Oncidium Twinkle is a primary hybrid of Onc ornithorhyncum x Onc cheirophorum . I grow this plant in a clay pot in an 8/1 mix of peat and coarse grade perlite with some chopped sphagnum moss added. A small amount of Osmocote High K fertilizer is added twice a year in Spring and Autumn and I spray with a foliar fertilizer about every 4 weeks using different brands alternately for a variety of trace elements. It is growing quite happily in the shady and cool position on the shelf below the cattleys which are spaced to allow a reasonable amount of light through.

As Alison and Alan and Clive and I were going to be away for the school holidays visiting family we had to produce the newsletter earlier than usual thus missing Marty's article on this plant.

Z. Titanic x Pab. jugosa

This intergeneric orchid has the full name of Zygopetalum Titanic x Pabstia jugosa. It was purchased November 2006 from John Woolf, who has a nursery at Toowoomba. At the time he had a large collection of Zygo. seedlings and mericlones for sale.

The label had the species Pab. jugosa written as Colax jugosa. I have looked this up in OrchidWiz and it tells me that this species has at varies times been a Colax, Lycaste, Maxillaria, Pabstia and Zygopetalum. The Royal Horticultural Society and Kew now says the accepted name is Pabstia jugosa.

I grow Zygos somewhat like my Cymbidiums except that they are in a shadier part of the greenhouse. They seem to prefer a darker position and a fair amount of water. I grow them under shade cloth and they can take any rain that comes down on them. The plants are potted in bark and this 200mm pot has small bark. Medium bark may be better. Fertilizer is a teaspoon of 8-9 month Hi K Osmocote when repotted and then at about yearly intervals. I also put 2 or 3 teaspoons of shell grit mixed in the bark when potting it up. I am not sure if it makes any difference, but the theory suggests it keeps the bark from going too acidic and provides a little calcium.

Zygos are easy to grow, flower usually in the autumn but sometimes again in the spring, mostly have a nice perfume, and the flowers last for a few weeks. Try some.
